

Berkley, Michigan Show Report

The turnout at the Berkley, Michigan show on July 29, 2023 was so good, the show host, Curtis Erickson, was able to refund money to dealers. Rather than \$30 a table, the cost was dropped to \$25. This was because twice as many dealers set up this year compared to last year, making it easier to cover the cost of the show Knights of Columbus Hall. Dealers came from as far away as Texas (Bob & Carolyn Berry) and Montana (Roger Ziesak) but also from surrounding states including Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, and Michigan (not a neighboring state but listed for completeness). Club members contributed to the strong showing of dealers and included Rick Soller, Mark Gilmore, Cole King, Gene Hawkins, J. Van Brown, Dale Glendenning, and Mike McLaughlin.

Besides the large number of dealers and reduced table costs, the show featured a quality auction, pleasant weather, many new collectors, and some great pieces changing hands. A lunch of pizza, water, and various soda pops was provided by the show host (aided by his parents, Ron and Ann Erickson). The announced dealer set up time of 8 a.m. saw a hive of activity in the parking lot and show hall even before this and the action continued until after 2:30 p.m., well beyond when the typical show dies out. I think everyone made it home safely and with a smile on their face.

There were some notable faces making it to the show but also a good group of younger collectors. Younger collectors included Mike Knox, Jonathan Warzecha, and Danielle Tirpkoff. Curtis Erickson and Barrett Nicpon have been moved to the middle category of seniority. Old timers included Rod Krupka, and Jack Snyder. Others we recognized at the show included John Hovanek & Sharon Foster (dealers), and Raven Kotlarsky, Michelle Kotlarsky (walk-ins).

Surprisingly, the weather was nice despite 100+ degree heat in the south. As the doors to the show opened, it was cool. A brief rain shower occurred shortly after this, but the rest of the day was sunny. The only time I felt uncomfortable was when elevated on the stage during the auction where the heat and humidity was closer to the ceiling.

Two dealers put some very nice lots in the auction, resulting in \$1371 in sales despite the smaller number of lots (59 vs. the usual 100+). Rick Soller called out bids, hovering high on the stage filled with box lots. Mike McLaughlin held up insulators in the lot being sold and identified the contents of boxes. Initially, Ann Erickson was strong-armed into agreeing to be the recorder, but Carolyn Berry replaced her before the 1:30 start of the auction. Her flowing handwriting and detail in the sheets made typing up the results below much more enjoyable. Thanks to both Carolyn and Mike for their help.

Statistics on each auction are collected so trends might be identified. The \$137 commission from the auction went to the show host to defer expenses. Maybe dealer tables will be even cheaper next year as a result! There were 24 people signed up for the auction with 14 of them being successful in buying something. Eight people put something in the auction. Unlike previous auctions, this one was held after lunch and started at about 1:30 p.m.

Also missing were about 10 to 15 porcelain entry insulators used in wood cutout boxes known as bird houses. Wabash Valley Insulator Club

At the Berkley, Michigan show, Cole King passed out an information packet and questionnaire regarding the potential formation of a new club and staging of a 2025 Wabash Valley Insulator Show. Some of the information from the five-page handout is reprinted below.

Hello, and thank you for your interest in the <u>possible</u> formation of our new insulator club and show.

The idea of a swap meet in central Indiana was formed by Cole King and J Van Brown nearly a decade ago. By sheer coincidence, I (ole) moved down south to Shelburn, IN in 2021, only 15 minutes away from J's farm in Jasonville. We have since bounced around the idea of a swap meet at his farm, and joked that we are the "Unofficial southern chapter of the Greater Chicago Area Insulator Club." In 2023, I made a fake logo based on this joke, and was met with overwhelming interest by folks who thought there really was a new insulator club. Since then, I have decided that an insulator show in Terre Haute, IN, may bring serious interest.

Terre Haute is situated just off of Interstate 70 and Highway 41. This location would be a prime spot to bring in collectors from all of the Midwestern states. And thus, the logo of a fire plug was chosen, as they were invented here in Terre Haute!

Before we commit to renting a show hall and printing up flyers, I would like to gather some "intel" on our prospective dealers and visitors. I would like this show to be a favorite for everyone in the Midwest, from Kansas to Pennsylvania. A show "by the people, for the people." If you think the show could be of interest to you, please let me know.

The city of Terre Haute was chosen over a rural swap meet in order to be more inviting to our out-of-state visitors. Terre Haute has many spots that would be helpful for an insulator show, like even centers and ample hotel accommodations. Also, there are plenty of things for tourists to do besides an insulator show! Museums include (but are not limited to) the Candles Holocaust Museum, the Terre Haute Children's Museum, and the Vigo County Historical Society, home to a wonderful display on the birth of the Coca-Cola contour bottle. Just an hour or so south on 41 is Vincennes, IN, which is a beautiful city full of history as well.

The original plan was for this show to be sponsored by the Greater Chicago Area Insulator Club (GCIC). But when I joked about the new "Wabash Valley club," many people seemed interested.

According to Wikipedia, "The Wabash Valley is a region located in sections of both Illinois and Indiana. It is named for the Wabash River and, as the name is typically used, spans the middle to the middle-lower portion of the river's valley and is centered at Terre Haute, Indiana. The term Wabash Valley is frequently used in local media in Clinton, Lafayette, Mount Carmel, Princeton, Terre Haute, and Vincennes all of which are either on or near the Lower Wabash River."

The Wabash Valley encompasses a large part of Indiana and Illinois, but the term is usually used to reference South Western Indiana and South Eastern Illinois. An insulator club centered in this area could be appealing to many collectors that may be geographically separated from either the GCIC or Dixie Jewels insulator clubs. In my mind, the target audience of the club would be Central and Southern Indiana, Missouri, Kentucky, and possibly parts of Tennessee and Ohio.
