



Fellow members,

If you did not make the Gettysburg National, you missed another great show. A new CD, couple of great seminars and of course the opportunity to catch up with friends. We also have our own You-Tube channel now, with a couple of videos already posted. See this and much more in this issue of Drip Points.

This year's NIA Board of Directors meeting had us discussing current issues as well as planning for the future of the NIA. The biggest issue discussed was the cost of publishing our first-class magazine, Drip Points. Over the last couple of years, various costs for the magazine have been increasing. The first issue is the increase in paper costs. This may have been precipitated by COVID, but it is an on-going issue. Also, beginning the first of the year, our publisher is having to charge tax on the magazine. Then we look at how our editorial staff has increased to keep up with Drip Points, which means an increase in software costs. This has also increased because of the printing of the Insulator Collectors Directory. Given the increases in these expenses, the cost of 6 issues of Drip Points is now more than one year's printed membership. With that in mind, we have passed new membership rates effective 1/1/2023. They are as follows:

With these changes, along with our donations, the NIA will be able to continue and to improve Drip Points and further other projects for our hobby. If anyone has questions regarding these changes, please feel free to contact me or any of the Board of Directors.

The NIA's function is to serve and educate our members and the hobby. We are successful because of the support and contributions of our members. The Board and I thank you for that.

Another change that will be effective with the coming year's membership renewals, is a change in the coupon given upon membership renewal. The use of this coupon has declined over the past few years and we looked at what we might do with it. Due to the NIA's 501(c)3 status, the Board felt that paying out money to other individuals, or organizations, might not be the best way for the NIA to utilize this coupon. We therefore decided to change it to be used for the purchase of NIA Logo products. It is also being increased to a \$5 coupon that can be used once per year. Watch for your membership renewal to see the coupon.

Another thing I am very excited about is a new way to use something you probably do very often, see Amazon Smiles on Page 10

To acknowledge members contributions, several new awards have been created, some given at the banquet in Gettysburg. The first are the new Drip Points Category Awards. See details on page 11.

Another award that we have initiated is a Regional Service Award, which the Regional Vice Presidents will award as they determine. This is meant to acknowledge those that might not be Nationally recognized, but still contribute to their region. There may be one award per region per year.

The other new award is our 50 Year Recognition Award. I would like to personally thank those members that have reached this level for their contributions to the hobby and continued support of the NIA. See more on page 12

We are still working on a traveling museum display for insulators. Brian Riecker has graciously built a mock cabinet for displays that we had on a table at Gettysburg. We have had some insulators donated over the last year. Some of these may be used in the display(s) and some of them may be sold to raise money for the cabinets. You can donate insulators (glass, porcelain or other) or money for this project. We are wanting to build one cabinet to be used in the Eastern Region first. If this is well received, then we will continue to build a cabinet for the Central and Western Regions.


Rick and Berny Baldwin have been involved in the insulator hobby and instrumental to the support and success of the Western Reserve Insulator Club since shortly after its founding.

Bill Meier has been involved with the insulator collecting hobby for decades. He was one of the pioneers in bringing technology to be a useful tool for collectors. For over 25 years, he has managed and grown the insulator collectors mailing list, now known as ICON (Insulator Collectors on the Net). He created the first significant world wide web presence for the insulator collecting hobby in insulators.com, now insulators.info. Over the years features have been added to the website that have great significance to the hobby and have contributed to it's growth. Insulators.info is the home base for ICON. The picture poster, Insulator Gazette and the Patent pages are some examples of the tools provided to the hobby by Bill.



In regards to the NIA, Bill has been a member since 1988. Bill & Jill have provided many displays at National shows and helped raise the standards for insulator show displays that have carried through to today. He received multiple awards at different Nationals for some most of his displays. Bill served as the Eastern Region Vice President 1995 – 1998 and Awards & Recognition Chairperson 2003 – 2005. Bill has assisted many show hosts, multiple times with name tags, directory assistance and display judging. He is a regular dealer at most Nationals and Springfield shows. He was a co-host for the 1995 & 2010 NIA National shows. He is currently a member of the NIA Directory and Technology committees.



Collectors of Australian porcelain will be delighted by the new book by Martin Brabon titled *Sunshine Porcelain Potteries – A Short History* which was copyrighted in 2021, not published until 2022, and recently added to the NIA archives (as well as my personal collection of books). Although the title suggests the book is brief in nature, nothing seems further from the truth. The 246 pages of the 8-1/2" x 11" book are jammed with extensive research and pictures on all aspects of the pottery. The footnotes alone take up 24 pages!


Brabon is ideally situated to write this book. He grew up living next to the Drayton family, who started the pottery, and spent much time with them. They also provided assistance and material to write the book. In addition, the factory was located a short distance from his childhood home.

Not every page is devoted to insulators. The book serves four audiences: A general audience, insulator collectors, jug collectors, and the people of the Melbourne suburb of Sunshine where the factory was located. Nevertheless, tidbits about insulators are sprinkled throughout the book.

Early chapters in the book provide a brief history behind the need for insulators as well as a description of the ups and downs of the pottery. Issues involving WWII as well as fires at the pottery, for example, are covered. Multiple aspects of the pottery are covered with a chapter on family members involved with the pottery and a chapter on production processes. This later chapter is especially relevant to anyone collecting porcelain insulators since it covers the raw materials used, how they were mixed, the firing process, and the testing process. Photographs of these processes cover several pages. Politics of running a business are also covered with discussion of tariffs, unionism, hiring of employees with criminal records, treatment of veterans, immigration, and charitable activities.

The 23 pages of chapter 7 are where insulators are covered in detail. Sunshine made a variety of insulators including fuse holders, cleats, massive radio tower bases, suspensions, shackles, strains, spools, bus bar, pedestal, fence, auger screw, rack, multipart, and, of course, pintype insulators. Catalog and color pictures of these are shown throughout the chapter. Noted collectors Teresa Dempsey and Noel Dawson provided some of the photographs for this chapter.

History of the National Show Commemoratives: "Collecting Our History"

Being an enthusiastic insulator collector, Frank Miller of Tulsa, Oklahoma went home from the First National Insulator Meet (that's what the "National" show was referred to as in 1970) held in New Castle, Indiana with an idea that collectors should have something by which they could remember the National meets. After months of struggling, he managed to have an insulator mold made. Frank said it was often referred to as "Frank's Last Folly" since he retired from teaching shortly thereafter. He also said it was worth the struggle. The commemorative insulator he designed replicated the early threadless "Pilgrim Hat" (CD 736) and is almost 4 inches high and is 31/4 inches across at the base. Since 1970, the glass commemorative has marked the National show event with new embossing for the location and a new color of glass. In 1979, the project continued on by John & Carol McDougald of Sedona, AZ. John and Carol produced the yearly commemoratives through 2009, at which time they donated the production to the National Insulator Association starting with the 2010 commemorative. Any profits made from the NIA Commemoratives go directly to benefit the National Insulator Association, a 501(c)(3).

First off, thank you to everyone who helped with this year's National in Gettysburg, PA. It was wonderful to host so many collectors from around the country. There's another article in this month's Drip Points that covers the National in detail, so I'd like to focus on something that happened behind the scenes. By now, everyone knows about the coming out party for the CD 206.7 "Power Claw" in Jeff Katchko's awesome Harloe Insulator Company Dig display. (See page 33 for details.) I thought you might like to see how the Power Claw came together – literally!

Jeff's decades of digging in Hawley, PA yielded five pieces that we were able to assemble into the unique insulator that stole the show in Gettysburg. The first portion of the repair was creating the missing half of the threads, and corresponding inner skirt. We made a latex mandrel using another Hawley insulator and molded the threads using Sculpey Modeling Clay.



We hardened the clay using a 100 watt lightbulb in a cardboard box.

With the insides in place, we added the two skirt pieces, making sure that we had solid concentric circles of the correct diameter.

With a solid base, we were now able to model the remainder of the external portion of the insulator. We carefully recreated the missing embossing using a CD 145 Harloe for scale.

Jeff was fortunate to find both side claws, but we were missing the front of the large "knuckle" in the middle. To assist in the reconstruction, we used a shard of a CD 206.5 as our model.

The final step in the preparation was smoothing out our repair and rounding the embossing to match the script on the original insulator. We molded the insulator and replaced the clay with color matched resin.

Being involved in the reconstruction of this historic Insulator was truly one of the highlights for me at this year's National. What will we find in the coming year? Who knows, but, I for one will be out there looking!

DISCOVERING THE CD 206.7 HARLOE'S No. 3.E. NO-TIE "POWER CLAW"

Perhaps the most famous products of the Harloe Insulator Company are the "claws" - a series of no-tie wire insulators based on Morton Harloe's patent 715375, issued in 1902. Up until the Gettysburg National, two varieties of these insulators were known – the CD 109.5 "small claw" and CD 206.5 "large claw". That all changed when Jeff Katchko made his presentation on Saturday, July 30.

Morton Harloe started with porcelain claw insulators. Those were successful, and he then decided to try the same in glass. Production of Harloe's glass no-tie insulators started at the Sterling Glass Company of Elmer, New Jersey, in March of 1903, but moved to a new plant in Hawley, Pennsylvania, that fall.

Several decades ago, Jeff Katchko located the old Harloe glass factory in Hawley. The factory itself was a small site, only a couple acres. He located the owner and received permission to dig the property, eventually bringing Steve Bobb and Ken Willick along. The group eventually dug almost the entire property over the next 20 years.

There are three types of small CD 109.5 Harloe claws known - the P1, the 12 P1, and the 14 P1, with the major difference is the thickness and shape of the claw fingers that secure the wire. The fingers get changed significantly between the variants, with Jeff

proposing that since glass has less mechanical strength than porcelain, these are iterations on the prototype design to deal with breakage issues in the fingers. Jeff found mold numbers 1-6 on the site. The medium size CD 206.5 claws come in two variants – the P2 and the P2S. Jeff notes that no P2S pieces were found at the Hawley site, and proposes that the S may stand for "Sterling". The P2S has larger claws and you can see straight through the wire slot, whereas all the other variants bind the wire between the claws. Again, there was signs of significant iteration in the dig, with mold numbers up to 8

found on the shards. The new 206.7 is now the largest known Harloe no-tie insulator. The one existing example was rebuilt from five pieces of glass composing 60% of

the insulator, mostly including the front claws and the embossing. Gus Stafford's excellent resin reconstruction forms the rest. Unlike the other two which have a model number starting with P - which Jeff posits may stand for "prototype" - this one carries the model number No. 3.E. Jeff found pieces of no less than 20 different 3E claws in four mold numbers, but this was the only one intact enough to rebuild. The nickname - "Power Claw" - can be attributed Ken Willick during the dig, since the piece is much physically larger than the two previously known variants.

What an amazing discovery, and what an amazingly appropriate time to introduce it to the hobby! Despite Jeff having most of the pieces for some 35 years now, the repair and reconstruction of the piece was only

completed two days before the show. A huge thank you to Jeff Katchko for his exhibit and presentation about his dig.



2023 NIA National Show Update · Logan, UT · June 9-11, 2023

Registrations for the 2023 NIA National show are now being accepted. Over 100 registration packets have been given out as of the 1st of September, when this update was written, with many already turned in. Even more packets and forms are being accessed online. The show hall can accommodate up to 144 sales tables, 30 display tables, wide aisles, and a relaxation area. This promises to be a large show and we expect many walk-in visitors. Despite the dangers in front of the vessel he piloted on toward an ominous wall of nature's fury. His skill and experience would be needed for what lie ahead. The passengers put their faith in his ability and hoped the perilous section ahead would lead to something both frightening and amazing. Something they had all paid to see. Ahead a dark wall of powerful wind and rain. Visibility would be very poor and giant hail was a strong possibility. As they entered the maelstrom the van was ponded by wind and rain. The road ahead was barely visible even with the wipers on full blast. It seemed insane but the adrenalin rush and thrill kept everyone focused. The driver knew that if could guide them through this pounding storm the other side might reveal a miracle of nature. Finally, after what had seemed like a long and dangerous stretch, they passed through to the other side of the wall. Suddenly the skies cleared, and they had entered a place so wild, so dangerous, that it is known as the Bears Cage. To the left was a towering 70,000-foot thunderhead and at its core grapefruit size hail. All around them veils of rain swirled in an eerie, circular pattern. To the right was one of the most astounding sights in all of nature. A towering vortex capable of producing winds in excess of 300 MPH. The gamble had paid off. After fighting their way through the wall of wind and rain there it was, a tornado. They call it the Bear's Cage for a reason. Occasionally a powerful storm develops a "hook" formation and on the tip of that hook a strong possibility of a tornado. They had punched their way through the hook into a pocket beyond imagination. Most people would be terrified to be trapped between a tornado and a massive thunderstorm. But these folks were thrill seekers, they had come from far and wide to be face to face with one of the wonders of nature. The man who skillfully led them there, the man who had all those lives in his hands, was of course our very own Bill Rohde. On that day and on other wild storm chases Bill proclaims, "I saw Dorothy"!

It all started many years earlier as a young boy growing up on the farm. Bill developed a fascination with storms from an early age. He began keeping records and learning about meteorology. Every time a big storm came, he wrote down all the details in a journal. One day he even saw a rare tornado in California and was hooked. Many years later he began driving for a storm chasing tour group out of Colorado. The tours normally lasted one week and would follow storms all over the Midwest. The big storms could be in Texas one day, Nebraska the next day, and Missouri the day after that. Many of those weeks racked up many thousands of miles with Bill behind the wheel. With every passing season Bill saw more tornadoes including some of the most famous. After 22 tours Bill has amassed an astounding 114 tornadoes! He has been on the cover of the Crown Jewels Directory at least 3 times standing in front of a twister. What's really cool is that the directory he's holding in the picture is also a picture of him in front of a tornado, and inside of that is yet another. It could go on forever!

Of course, storm chasing can be a risky business. A few years ago, three vans got a little too close. Bill, in the lead van somehow made it through okay. The other two vans were hit by cyclone force winds. One van rolled into a ditch, the other rolled several times into a field. Luckily no one was seriously hurt. There have also been many dents and destroyed windshields. Bill has handled it all in stride and is a bona fide expert storm chaser.





DID YOU KNOW?



So, you are now an insulator collector! Well then, exactly what is an insulator? When I'm asked this question, the answer is most obvious to

me, but it's not the easiest question to answer in nontechnical terms. The quick answer is those things up on the telephone poles that hold the wires. But then the next

question is, "What's their purpose?"



Soooo -- while keeping things as simple as possible here's a roundabout answer. The dictionary definition of "insulate" is "to cover, line, or separate with a material that prevents or reduces the passage, transfer, or leakage of heat, electricity, or sound". Although most electrical insulating material is also a good heat insulating material, our focus will be on electrical insulation. The

two most basic requirements that must be accommodated when working with electricity are a means to pass, or conduct, electrical current to where it is needed and prevent, or insulate, electrical current from flowing to where it is not supposed to go. Both of these requirements and their solutions can be found in every electrical device and application. They range from the microscopic elements of micro-electronics to the huge wires and insulators found in electrical power transmission. This article will focus on the above ground transmission of electricity for power (homes, factories, electric trains, etc.) and signaling (telegraph, telephone, railroad signals, etc.), both of which use the insulators that we collect.


Wire is the most commonly used conductor, or way of delivering electricity to where it is needed. Wire is metallic and most often copper or aluminum. However, early telegraph applications used steel wire for strength and later

copper coated steel wire for strength and better conductivity. In the case of the insulators we collect, the insulator is placed between the wire and the wood or metal pin that supports it.



A typical electrical circuit is a complete loop where electrical current flows out from a power source and back again (i.e. from a positive battery terminal via wire, thru a light bulb,

and back to the negative battery terminal). The voltage (volts) of the source (battery or



power line) times the current (amps) determines the amount of power (watts) that is consumed. The power consumption of a light bulb, and other electrical devices, is generally measured in watts. When current flows through the circuit the light bulb glows and electrical power is consumed. Voltage is primarily what determines the size of

an insulator, particularly the surface distance from the conductor to the mounting pin. The CD 327 shown, and other large insulators like it, have long

distances from the conductor to the mounting pin allowing

for high voltage operation. Current is what determines the wire size and thus the size of the wire the insulator must support. Insulators like the CD 267.5 were made for very high current (i.e. electric trains) and relatively low voltage. They must also support the weight of the heavy conductor wire.

Now, back to the light bulb circuit -- If the wire going to the light bulb ever comes in contact with the wire coming back from the light bulb, we have a "short circuit" or failure of the circuit. The light bulb offers resistance (Ohms) to the flow of current thus limiting it. A short circuit offers very



little resistance causing arcing, blown fuse or circuit breaker, melting of the wire, and possibly a fire. That is why the wires must be insulated. Today, most electrical

wire (insulated wire) has non-conductive material around the metal conductor to insulate it (i.e. house wiring). In the early days of electrical circuits bare metal wire was used exclusively and insulated with the insulators that we collect today. As you are already aware, these insulators come in many forms including glass, porcelain, composite, wood, etc. Bare wire is still used today in above ground power transmission lines, but rarely used elsewhere. Most communication lines now use insulated wire and are buried underground. Even those are rapidly being replaced with



fiber optic cables that do not carry electrical current and do not require any electrical insulation. Radio waves, or wireless, is another replacement for wire.

The basic role of insulation in the light bulb example is typical of nearly all electrical circuits. When it comes to

applications such as
power transmission,
the result of a short
circuit can be
catastrophic. A
short circuit can
occur when power
lines touch each
other, break and
reach the ground
(earth ground is an
excellent conductor,
particularly when
wet), contacts



another object, an insulator cracks and lets water in, etc. A shorted power line can start a fire, kill a person or animal, waste enormous amounts of power, and cause widespread power outages. In the case of signaling, a short circuit shuts down the entire signaling function of the line.

Now that you know a bit more about what an insulator really is and what it does, maybe the better answer to "What is an insulator?" should be a device that prevents electrical catastrophes. Without insulators we would not be able to control electrical power. We would not have all of the modern-day conveniences that electricity affords us. While electrical insulation now comes in many forms, the insulators that we collect are attractive tokens of a bygone era that our children and grandchildren may never relate to. Let's continue to preserve this piece of history and educate our friends.



THE INTERNATIONAL INSULATOR COLLECTORS MEETING

The International Insulator Collectors Meeting finally took place in Krefeld, Germany between July 8th-10th. Originally scheduled for July 2020 the show had to be postponed due to the pandemic. It was rescheduled for the following year with the expectation that the pandemic would have subsided but continuing infections and lockdowns meant a second postponement was inevitable. So again it was put back until the summer of 2022 when eventually the show would go ahead regardless.

The event was well attended with collectors from eight European countries in attendance. These were Czechia (The Czech Republic), Germany, Hungary, Italy, Netherlands, Spain, Sweden and the United Kingdom. Whilst most collectors drove to the show I flew to Dusseldorf and walked the ten miles to Krefeld. However, the most determined traveller was Paolo from Italy who cycled the 600 mile journey in four days. It was great to see so many familiar faces again after a four year absence along with collectors for who this is their first event.

The venue for the show was a former Cognac distillery known as Weinbrennerei Dujardin which is now a museum and restaurant. The first day was spent setting up the show and offloading the insulators. After this we enjoyed some food and German beer beside the river in the evening sun.

Saturday was the main day when trading of the insulators took place. As is the tradition with shows in Europe there is no money involved which is a system which has worked well since I attended my first such event 15 years ago. After the insulators were traded the show wound down and a guided tour of the museum was given. German tax laws made production of liquor uneconomic so production moved to France. Most of the equipment remains in place and has been well preserved. We were also given a small taster of the company's cognac. Later that evening we enjoyed a meal at the museum's restaurant.

On Sunday I made the return journey to Dusseldorf by foot to catch my flight home. For those staying longer some tours of nearby attractions formed part of the show itinerary. Show host Marco Schmitz-Le Hanne did a great job in putting on the show. I first met Marco at the 2004 National in New Kensington, PA.

The next European show is scheduled to take place in Hungary in 2024 to be hosted by Zoltan Drinoczi at his large field in the south of the country. I will be there and I hope you will be too.



https://www.r-infinity.com/Fred_Lockes_Attic/index.htm Jeff Katchko and Ken Willick have been digging a site that we think could be where all the insulators in Fred Locke's attic were dumped when his house in Victor, NY was sold in 1953 to Jake Garvey. I talked to Mr. Garvey in 1993 during a research trip for my book, Fred M. Locke: A Biography. He said the attic was full of all sorts of papers from Fred Locke's insulator business and a large number of insulators. It seems Fred Locke never threw anything away that could be used to support his experimentations and patents. When Mr. Garvey and his sons cleaned out the attic, all the insulators were dumped someplace and all the papers were burned in a huge bonfire. J. Sheldon Fisher heard of the unfortunate incident and rushed to the site of the bonfire, but only managed to save a handful of letters. After nearly three years of digging at an undisclosed location, Jeff and Ken have decided to show many of the insulators and other items in 2006 at the NIA National show in Austin, TX in June and the Mid-Ohio Insulator Show in Springfield Nov. 4-5. There will be about 15-18 new U-numbers assigned. This is probably the most exciting find in the history of porcelain insulators -- and there are glass insulators, too. We knew Fred Locke was a prolific inventor and experimented with many different insulator designs and manufacturing techniques, but the "attic dig" has uncovered a vast display of just how prolific he was beyond our previous expectations.





The above line drawing and photo are of the CD 286 Prototype dug at Locke's Attic Dig, as you can see the skirt is not as rounded as the CD 286, There was no new CD number issued for it. as its so close to the orginal CD 286, on the right is the (M-2201) Porcelain answer to its glass counterpart it's the only one know and was designed to use a porcelain or Glass inner sleeve, can you imange how great this would have looked with a glass inner skirt. Back in March my friends (Richard and Jake) and I embarked on one of our week long hunting trips in the wilds of Wales, searching long abandoned power lines in the hope of discovering the weird and wonderful first generation insulators.

We made the brave choice to camp for the whole week near a remote "A" pole line built by the Ebbw Vale Steel Iron and Coal Co., and planned to spend the whole second day hunting here. I wrote an article on the same line back in 2020, where we found some fantastic Bullers Hewlett insulators. The hunting ground was fantastic, and we had only covered a small portion of the line.

The original pin type insulators used by the EVSI&C Co. were a pattern that has been on my personal bucket-list for a long time – two piece cemented deltas with the "BULLERS Ltd. LONDON" text marking. These deltas are really the origin of what we know as the Bullers P5065. The text marking (originating around 1898) was superseded by the hand holding an insulator logo sometime around 1910-1912, meaning any power insulator with this marking is slap bang in the right era. So, on with the hunt!

It was an early start, and after a chilly night in the tent we were eager to get walking. Directly behind the campsite was our hunting ground, which promised to hold all sorts of interesting finds.

up a steep path and intersected the old cutting where a number of stumps for the original A poles soon became visible. On the ground were some exciting fragments of what we were looking for; the "BULLERS LTD. LONDON" delta types with a dark brown, speckled glaze (Picture 1). There were pieces of Hewletts too, but no brackets or poles.

First we walked along to the old colliery site which the power line had fed, before we cut

We decided that our best chances were probably in searching thoroughly below the pole sites for some distance, as the steep terrain meant that discarded insulators and brackets had rolled downhill – something we had discovered on our last hunt of the EVSI&C Co. line in 2020.

While Richard rested and looked around a pole stump, Jake and I ventured off into the trees to search. Our theory was soon proven as nestled against a fallen tree under a blanket of spruce needles were three brackets, one containing a lovely ink stamped Bullers delta in mint condition (Picture 2).



A little further up, the line took a sharp turn and ran along the hillside. The corner pole was lying in pieces, with some 1930s and 40s hewletts scattered on the ground around it. A fantastic find here was one of the original cast iron danger signs, massive beasts that are in no way rucksack friendly! The pole contained a lovely pair

Picture 5 shows a standing A pole with three short arms, and a single modern replacement pole further on behind it. Picture 6 shows a discarded string of hewletts found close to one of the pole stumps. The line was now becoming harder and harder to follow and it seemed that forestry operations had obliterated all trace. It's sad to see an untouched line churned up like this, but as it soon became apparent, there was a silver lining to it all.


In between messy lines of trash were patches of quite bare ground where the spruce trees had been; this meant that any surviving insulators were now easier to spot. The remains of fallen pole with a single hewlett hanging from the arm pointed us in the right direction.



white porcelain spools too, which were duly rescued (Pictures 3 and 4).

It was here that I decided to scramble downhill as far as the next forestry track, and then zig zag back up below the pole site. Jake joined me with his camera. The first find was actually close to the pole and quite a rarity – a lovely little composite



Jake snapped a picture of me seconds after pulling the insulator out of the ground (Picture 8), the big grin followed a bit later! Picture 9 shows the insulator on the ground. The finds continued after this, and we discovered three broken apart deltas below the next pole site. These were all marked with the early logo and have a mix of lighter brown glazes (Pictures 10 and 11). They all have a ¾" cordeaux threaded pinhole, another sure sign of their age.

The hillside shortly revealed yet more broken deltas, and I'm pleased to report that we managed to save a handful of BLL and logo marked examples for repair. Amongst these insulators were some more bizarre fragments which have raised a few questions. Fragments of a much earlier and smaller type of delta (Picture 12), some sort of large European made slot top insulator and bits of white Curtoys pattern. Perhaps the Bullers Ltd London deltas were not the original insulators used on this line afterall, which would make it a bit earlier than we first imagined. We'll solve the mystery one day, for now though, on with the hunt.

It was about mid morning, and we stopped at a forestry track for a break. From there, the old cutting ran through untouched forest and was a bit more gentle to follow. Picture 13 shows one of the old poles as it was left. We had spread out across the hillside to search a wide area again, and while I was taking picture 13 I heard Jake and Richard shouting me from further up. Jake had found something exciting!



This was the last great find of the day, but the rest of the line was certainly enjoyable to hunt. Both sides of the large valley that the line crossed held very little apart from broken P5065 and P5064 deltas (Picture 15). Buried halfway up the valley side however, was a second cast iron danger sign in great condition. I've no idea what the locals thought as I caried it through the town on our way back to the campsite!

By the time we descended the last hillside towards the "start" of the line, it had become apparent how lucky we had been earlier in the day. Every old insulator that we found after the P3510 was heavily damaged. We saved a few more good condition tops, but struggled to find any good inners. One top is shown in picture 16; that isn't mud smeared on it, it's the glaze!

I've no doubt that there are more complete insulators buried along this line, and we will return for an even more thorough search soon enough. There is still a lot of mystery as to the actual age of the line though, and the original construction. We now suspect that it was only single circuit to begin with, although the mix of different sized insulators is unusual. Perhaps the second circuit was added a little later and run at a different voltage?

Despite there being virtually no documentation of these early UK power lines, it is really exciting to discover again and again that the timeline seems to go back further than we think. Every line holds surprises and gives up tantalising clues that keep the hunt fresh!





A snippet of history about the Bullers "delta" insulators...


In my article I mention Bullers P5065, P5064 and other patterns that we call "deltas". This general style was developed between 1900 and 1910, around the same time similar US and European types were first being used. Picture A shows a sketch from an early article illustrating the comparison, with what we call the classic UK delta pattern on the left. While these will have naturally evolved from the early triple shedded mushroom patterns, it is clear there was also a lot of homework copying going on between engineers!



The "true" delta style was originally developed in Europe just before 1900 and looked a lot different to start with (Picture B), but the name seems to have spread to cover most of the large triple shedded power pin types. The Bullers Ltd London marked example found in Wales is a good representation of what the first British versions looked like, with a chunky square crown, wide top shed and long straight inner. The inner - or lower portion - was usually separate, with the crown and top two sheds being one piece. The two halves were then cemented together, as shown in Picture C. Also note the drip edge on the top shed, which can be found on nearly all of the larger deltas.

Bullers incorporated a strict pattern numbering system quite early on, which is where the P. numbers come from. The most common series of delta patterns that we find here are the P506- numbers, ranging from the P5063 (the smallest) to the P5067 (the monsters). Picture D shows the robust P5064 pattern, with a shallower crown and relatively small top shed. The ink stamped example shown in the article is a P5064, which was later made as a unipart as with many others.

The P5065 is the closest in proportions to the Bullers Ltd. London and early logo pieces we found on the EVSI&C Co. line, and a similar example (found in 2020) marked "P5065" confirms that they are likely of this pattern.

Many companies favoured these two piece insulators, and adopted them early on. It didn't take long before a myriad of sizes and variations in shape were created, as seen with the P3510 found on the EVSI&C Co. line. I hope this provides a bit of history; I have a lot more to write on deltas, but I will save that for their own article!
