

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

In our July issue we had a picture sent to us by Steve Bobb of Audubon, PA. Since then we have received the following replys:

Dear Jim:

This insulator is pictured in Brown's book pg. 40, and you'll note he has a clue that it might have been made by Wisc. Porc Co. This is the "twist-lock" type of "wire-holder" insulator.

Without the company literature on this item, I cannot say how it was intended to be used. However, it appears obvious that it was used in applications where it was convenient to first install the insulators and then to string the wires. It also is useful in cases where broken insulators can be replaced without the necessity of cutting the wire.

Needless to say, this insulator is used in "slack wire" applications much the same as the standard "forestry" in sulators. That is a tie wire is not used and the conducto can ride through the insulator if the tree (or other support) moves back and forth. The U-186 porcelain pin type is identical in principal with your specimen. This is covered by Patent No. 1, 107,111, Aug. 11, 1914, B. S. Purkey.

* * * * * * * * * * This letter comes from Mike Bonne of Knightstown, IN.

Jim,

I thought I'd write about the porcelain insulator pictured on pg. 21 of the July issue. We have, as far as I know 4 such insulators here in Knightstown. 2 are screwed

horizontily into a tree and carry wires. The other two are on opposite ends of a "2 X4" bolted on a pole. They are vertical and "look" like they were used to carry the wires around the corner (they're not it use now).

Enclosed is a photo of a little porcelain I picked up in a communications insulator storage acerage, the only emb. is R T & SON it is glazed all over except pinhole & bottom. It's white, the groove is closer to the top than bottom. Several inquiries have been unsuccessful, is there even ANYTHING else embossed R T & SON???

EDITOR'S NOTE:

My own impression was that R T & SON stood for R. Thomas & Son. but Jack Tod had never seen a R T & SON embossed. His information only lists R T & S CO After taking a foil rubbing (as Jack suggested) Mike



and I seem to agree that it must be R T & S CO. There seems to be a dispute as to whether it stands for R. Thomas and Son as a similiar insulator was found on the right of way of Rochester Transit & Subway Co. (note initials). Would be interesting to hear any comments anyone has on anything with similiar embossings.


Jack Tod has suggested that anyone who has an embossing they would like to reproduce could do so easily by placing a piece of new and smooth aluminum foil over marking and repeatedly pressing all over details with pencil eraser. To keep the impression from being damaged by mail cut a hole in the cardboard which would fit over and "cushion" the rubbing, then tape to card-


board. Another way is to put a puddle of glue on back of foil marking and allow to dry for a day then tape to letter in position where it will be lower left corner of envelope when inserted-to keep it away from the cancelling roller.






KNOW YOUR COLLECTOR



PATENT INFORMATION

Patent No. 105,834, dated July 26, 1870.

I, Samuel Oakman, of Boston in the State of Massachusetts, have invented a certain new and useful Telegraphic Insulator.

The nature of my invention consists in constructing, as an article of manufacture, an insulator of glass, so formed interiorly that it may be easily and securely attached to its support, and exteriorly that it protects the wire surrounding it and its supporting-plug.

Figure 1 is a perspective view of my insulator. Figure 2 is a vertical section, showing the insulator and supporting-plug.

The outside of my insulator is made of the general shape represented in fig. 1. The object of the projecting flange is to protect the wire from rain.

The interior of my insulator is formed, as shown, in fig. 2. If the stock "H", fig. 2, is driven in, with the wedge "K" inserted as shown, the wood will fill the incline recesses and thus hold the insulator firmly in place.

By this arrangement it will be seen that, when the insulator is once fastened to the stock "H", it will not work off, as the wood is forced into the recesses.

THE BROOKS' PARAFFIN INSULATOR

... Upwards of 100,000 of these Insulators have been sent to California this season, mostly for the Central Pacific Railroad.

The above excerpts were taken from a pamphlet published in 1870 by David Brooks to advertise the merits of the Brooks' Paraffin Insulator.

The paraffin insulator referred to in these letters was patented by Brooks in 1864, Patent No. 45, 221. It was a rams horn type set in a metal case, the horn being embeded in glass and then set in the metal outer shell. Finally, the remainder of the outer shell was filled with paraffin. See following page for Patent Drawing.

Mr. Brooks went to a lot of trouble to solicit testimonials from a variety of companies that used his insulator. This pamphlet also lists an assortment of tests and exposures his insulators were subjected to.

Again the name of Frank L. Pope appears in connection with insulators. This time as a sup't rather than an attorney. (see patents in August issue-Editor's note).

Some of the questions raised by this research article are:

- 1. Where are the 15,000 and 100,000 insulators used by the Pennsylvania and Central Pacific Railroad?
- 2. What railroad company had the initials L. & S. R. R.?




