

GREELEY by Penni Branham

I noticed in your August issue of CROSS ARMS a picture of a CD 188, embossed Greely, N. Y. I don't know if this was a printing error or a mistake on the actual insulator, but this little gem is supposed to say Greeley. Thinking you might be interested in a little follow-up information, I enclose a short biography.

Edwin S. Greeley was a banker and businessman who lived most of his life in New Haven, Conn. He entered the Civil War as a First Lieutenant in the 10th Connecticut Infantry and rose to be its colonel, later being brevetted Brigadier General for gallant services. (Brevetted means being promoted to higher rank without higher pay.) On November 1, 1865, General Greeley, along with a Mr. W. H. Holt, and Luther G. Tillotson, founded the house of L. G. Tillotson & Co. at 26 Dey Street in New York City. (You will remember that Tillotson had founded his business several years before this, but apparently he was able to expand greatly with the additional capital of two partners. Shortly afterwards, he resigned his superintendency with the Erie RR Telegraph to devote full time to his business.)

Mr. Tillotson died in 1885, and 1886 the name of the firm was changed to E.S. Greeley & Co. A late 1880's ad read:

E.S. Greeley & Co.
Successors to L.G. Tillotson & Co.
Manufacturers, Importers and Dealers in
Railway and Telegraph Supplies
Nos. 5 and 7 Dey St.

The firm offered the same goods and services as it did when under Tillotson's command, emphasizing electrical supplies in later years.

The "Brown's Pony" style insulator was patented by Robert G. Brown (assignor to E.S. Greeley & Co.) on Nov. 23, 1886. Since Greeley was involved in the patenting of the insulator, the embossed Greeley just might be one of the original "Brown's Ponies."

Wish I could say who made the Greeley insulators. Since Brookfield was so successful during this period, I thought first of him. He was still at 45 Cliff St. in 1886, and it is very possible that Greeley contacted him to make his insulators. From 1890-1894, however, Brookfield and Greeley were neighbors, Brookfield being at 81 and 83 Fulton Street, and Greeley being at 82 and 84 Fulton Street. What a co-incidence--makes you think that Mr. Greeley ran right across the street to Friend Brookfield to place his order for insulators-- and all this is pure speculation!

Well, Mr. Greeley remained with the business until 1905. He was getting on in years then, and retired, probably with a bundle. He died in January of 1920, in his eighty-seventh year.

A 1900 Locke Victor catalog illustrates the Locke line of glass insulators available for purchase. Most of the insulator shapes have already been located by collectors and identified by their embossings. Here are four that to my knowledge have not been found.

Locke #48-CD 259 Locke #51-CD 254 Locke #50-CD 252 Locke #52-CD 267

Another interesting note: CABLE is the most common found embossings on these CD's. The only loose end left is CD 261 which is also embossed CABLE. Editor.




KNOW YOUR COLLECTOR


Lucille also takes an active part in a local bottle club and is a devoted "digger."

Dolph and Lucille and pictured below with some of their best pieces which are displayed in an old mail post office cabinet which they have restored.



l to r: CD 731 dome embossed Tillotson (blue); Wade CD 723 Dots and Dashes (apple green).






These six lightning "thru holes" are a small sampling of Dolph and Lucille's lightning collection (colors range from aqua, sca, & emerald green).

The letter in your Sept. issue from Mr. J. L. Mingle Sup't telegraph L. & S. R. R. adding testimony to the value of the Brook's Paraffin Insulator comes from the Lehigh & Susquehanna Railroad.

According to the June 1868 Official Railway Guide this railway extended from Scranton, Pa. to Easton, Pa. a distance of 121 miles where it connected with the Central RR of NJ for New York City.

The L. & S. R. R. was operated by the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Co. The railroad was later acquired by the Jersey Central.

Dear Editor,

I read with interest your article on the Brook's Paraffin Insulator in the Sept. issue of your magazine.

In reference to your question on the L. & S. R. R., I believe it stands for the Lehigh and Susquehanna Railroad which was part of the Jersey Central system.

In recent months I have done much research into the meaning of the P. L. W. as it appears on the CD 462. I have heard ventured many possibilities, two very amusing definitions are the Pennsylvania, Lackawanna and Western (a non existent line which seems to have borrowed its name from the old Delaware, Lackawanna

and Western) and the Pittsburgh Light and Water Company.

From the outset I have thought that the P. L. W. must be related to the P. R. R. because of the similarity of their insulators, and I have guided my research in this direction. To date I have come up with the following: On April 7, 1870 the Pennsylvania Railroad Company formed the Pennsylvania Company whose purpose was to hold and manage all P. R. R. lines west of Pittsburgh and Erie, Pa. In the literature I have researched the Pennsylvania Company is referred to as the Pennsylvania's "Lines West" system. This leads me to speculate that the P. L. W. embossed some CD 462's stands for Pennsylvania's "Lines West." It would be interesting to know where P. L. W. insulators are found. I'll bet that the majority are found west of Pittsburgh and Erie, Pa.

Enclosed please find a copy of a story concerning the P.R.R., Western Union Telegraph Co. and Postal Telegraph Co. which may prove of interest.

Reprint from Burgess, G. H. and M. C. Kennedy (1949). "Centennial History of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company page 515, 516:

One of the interesting episodes in the Gould-Pennsylvania struggle had to do with the Western Union Telegraph Company, which was controlled by the Gould estate. This company had a 20 year contract for the occupancy of the Pennsylvania's right of way and other facilities which expired in September 1901. Negotiation

for the renewal of the contract had been begun sometime prior to its expiration date, but the parties had been unable to agree on the terms. In due course, the Railroad Company decided to substitute the Postal Telegraph Company for the Western Union, and served formal notice on the latter company to remove its poles and wires and other property from the right of way. When no response was made to this demand, the railroad offered to buy the lines. This offer was likewise ignored and Western Union brought suit to enjoin the Pennsylvania from interfering with its property. The Federal Circuit Court for the District of New Jersey issued the injunction prayed for, but on appeal it was reversed by the Circuit Court of Appeals and the rights of the Railroad Company thus fully established.

This decision was handed down on May 19, 1903, and President Cassatt decided there was nothing more to wait for. On the night of May 21, the section gangs, extra gangs, and work trains were called out all over the railroad, and by the following morning, the poles of the Western Union Company had been torn down from one end of the railroad to the other, and the right of way was lined with a tangled mass of wire and timber. This was probably as drastic an act of eviction as has ever occurred in railroad history.

Note: Manhattans were made to receive a #3 cable in their wire groove. "C" is the "squat" or "baby" Manhattan with a standard groove.





PATENT INFORMATION


Thomas F. Gaynor, Louisville, KY., assignor to the Gaynor Electric Company. 437,685.

Be it known that I, Thomas F. Gaynor residing at Louisville, Kentucky, have invented a useful Improvement. in Insulators.

My invention relates to improvements in insulators for electric wires, its object is to provide an insulator which shall indicate the nature or kind of wire it is designed to support.

"A" represents the insulator, which is of the ordinary glass form, having the internal thread "B", cylindrical cavities "C" and "D", and external groove "G", like all others of its class. Upon its surface, however, a coating "E" of light-reflecting material, is glazed or otherwise united thereto, by which the light from the sun or sky is reflected, thereby giving the insulator a peculiar and attractive appearance compared with ordinary insulators. This glaze may consist of colored glass or other glazing substances adapted to glass, and may also cover a coating "F" of mercury or the like. It may also extend over the entire surface of the insulator, or it may be limited to the inner cavity. I find that a red color applied to the insulator produces a very desirable effect for this purpose, although any suitable color or combination of colors may be made, as desired.

A telegraph-line provided with insulators having this improvement can be readily identified and distinguished from others among which it may be placed.



Patent No. 254, 610, dated March 7, 1882.

Be it known that I, William H. Capewell, residing at Philadelphia in the State of Pennsylvania, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Insulators for Telegraph-Wires.

This invention relates to insulators for holding telegraph-wires; and it consists in an improved construction of the insulator, as herein shown and described.

Fig. 3 represents a transverse central section of the insulator as constructed with my improvement.

A designates a semi-spherical block of glass or other material that is a non-conductor of electricity, said block resting in a socket in the supporting piece or holder "B". Across the rounding surface of the block "A", and following the line of the surface, is made a groove, "a", to receive the telegraph-wire "b", which passes through the groove, as shown.

"C" indicates a block of glass the exact counterpart of "A", and as both are cast or formed in the same mold they may be transposed in position, the concavity of one fitting the convexity of the other, and vice versa. The wire, being placed in the groove, is bent and clamped between the two blocks.

The parts "B" and "D" forming the casing are usually hinged together at one end.

I claim--in an insulator, one or more blocks "A", having a rounding surface and a concave surface, "c" and provided with groove "a", substantially as and for the purposes described.









Two views of the California Egg--Guy strain insulator embossed CALIFORNIA no CD no. From Ray Richter of Mt. Shasta, California.


