

THE FISHER ELECTRIC RAILWAY SYSTEM by Gerald and Esta Brown

An ad in the "STREET RAILWAY JOURNAL" of 1885 advertised the Fisher Railway System for street and suburban traffic. The ad said, "The only successful system using an underground conductor; 8 miles of conduit in one road in San Jose, California." The advertiser was The Detroit Electrical Works, whose address was 7th and Woodbridge Sts., Detroit, Michigan.

The following information comes to us from Addison H. Laflin, Secretary of the Bay Area Electric Railroad Association and from A. W. Bond, Treasurer of the Tramway Museum, Derbyshire, England. Part of the information comes from a book by Charles McCaleb of California.

In the mid 1880's, on the West Coast, the city of San Jose, California was booming. The mayor and city officials had launched a massive improvement program. The time had come for Bishop, Rich and Associates to consider up-dating the city's antiquated horse-car railway system with something new, modern and more efficient. The officials were ready to buy new transportation equipment if the governing bodies approved.

Bishop proposed to put in an electric railway in preference to the popular cable roads. He favored an over-head wire power source but met with much opposition to this method of supplying power to the cars.

In 1886, a trip took Bishop to St. Louis, MO where an experimental 3-rail electric system was being demonstrated, the product of a young Detroit inventor named Frank E. Fisher. Bishop was impressed by the demonstration, and went to visit Highland Park,

Michigan, a suburb of Detroit, where a full scale rail system was under construction.

Fisher claimed that his electric system would save 60% over a horse car operation; the run from San Jose to Santa Clara could be made in 20 minutes in comparison to 45 minutes with horse cars.

The cars of the new road would run on 20# steel rails mounted at street level in the conventional manner; the third rail would be fabricated of 14# iron bars and be mounted below the street in a concrete tunnel, cemented on the bottom. GLASS INSULATORS would be used to support the third rail which would have a companion 5/8" copper wire added to improve the iron's current carrying capacity. This under ground power source would solve the problem of opposition to the overhead wire power source.

The men selected the cars to be used; light weight affairs resembling those of the San Francisco's cable roads. Fisher estimated the cost of the system at \$500,000.00. Although the cost of the underground conduit would be great; about \$40,000.00 per mile, he explained that the cost of a cable system would be higher.

Fisher finally offered the full facilities of the Detroit Electrical Works, of which he was manager, to build the necessary equipment and to install the system. Bishop accepted the idea. So the ambitious inventor who had risen from an apprentice electrician to head his own firm, came to design San Jose's first electric railway system.

Bishop and his associates now moved to build the electric railway. They hoped to establish the first electrified railway west of the Rockies. Contracts were

let to the Pullman Company for 12 cars and to the Detroit Electrical Works for equipment except the cars. The San Francisco Electric Improvement Co. was hired to build the road.

Construction was slow to start. There was a shortage of cement to build the tunnel and other difficulties arose. Construction actually got under way on October 5, 1887. An announcement from San Diego in December, told that a line 4 miles long had been completed there, thus depriving San Jose of being able to operate the West's first electric rail line.


The first test of the San Jose-Santa Clara line was made March 16, 1888. One car left the car stables for Santa Clara with 43 passengers aboard. 150 yards short of Agricultural Park the car slowed to a stop when it's contact carriage (or trolley) struck the protruding cap of an insulator. This failure was only a forerunner of things to come. Regular service was established July 28th. Fisher was acting as operating superintendent and announced that the line carried 40,000 persons during fair week. The fare was one nickel.

Mechanical failures continued to plague the service of the underground electric circuit. Wires burned and broke in the electric motors. Dislodged wires sometimes charged an entire car. The underground rails expanded and contracted, cracking and dropping away from the Glass insulators. Mud and stones gathered in the conduit, far beyond the flushing capacity of the system. Troubles persisted and in mid October the line had come to a standstill. Horse cars again returned to the Alameda.

This is the story of the origin and the use of the FISHER INSULATOR. Two different models of the

insulator have been found, one of each kind which are embossed with the words, "FISHER ELECTRIC RAIL-WAY SYSTEM--BUILT BY DETROIT ELECTRICAL WORKS." Several other insulators of the same style have been found which have NO embossing. We believe that all of the insulators have been dug in the San Jose area. These old and beautiful pieces of glass are the relics of a broken dream of Frank E. Fisher.










Dale Young of Independence, MO, winner of "Show Trophy" for lightning rod balls and "OBX Ribbon" for Showmanship.



Dale has a large general collection and his current project is to acquire a CD 121 from every state. Dale is also active in the "ownership tags" end of the hobby.


He writes many letters to collectors everywhere and will correspond with any collector who writes to him


TREASURER—Dennis McHenry has opened a N. I. A. banking account with the membership fees and is working on printing stationary, membership cards and membership applications.


SHOW COMMITTEE No report. The Fifth National show site is still up in the air.

Minard Y Holley, of Washington, District of Columbia IMPROVEMENT IN TELEGRAPH-INSULATORS Letters Patent No. 121,368 dated November 28, 1871

Be it known that I, Minard Y. Holley, of Washington, District of Columbia, have invented an Improvement in Telegraph-Insulators, of which the following is a specification:

My improvement consists in constructing insulators, of glass or other non-conducting substance, of a triangular form, thereby presenting only three points of contact to the line and attaching-wire, and, consequently, saving a large amount of surface contact and a corresponding decrease in escape or leakage of the electric current in damp or wet weather.


Fig. 2 represents a view of the under side of the insulator with the line-wire attached. dd represents the line-wire; ccc, the wire attachment; aaa, the point of contact; and B, the aperture for the support.

The accompanying drawing—in which Figure 1 represents a perspective view, and Fig. 2 a view of the under side of the insulator—shows the nature of the improvement.

In Fig. 1 AAA represent the insulator; DD, the line-wire, CC, the wire that attaches the line-wire to the insulator. EEE represent the notches in which the line and attachment-wires rest. B represents the aperture for the support.

Be it known that I, W.E. Simonds, of Hartford, in the county of Hartford, and State of Connecticut have invented a new and useful Improvement in Telegraph—Wire Insulator;...

Fig. 1 is a central vertical section of my improved telegraph-wire insulator.

Fig. 2 is a detached view of the cap or insulated portion of the device...

This invention relates to an improvement in the construction of insulators for telegraph-wires, and consists in forming the glass, flint, or other insulated portion of the device, independent of the peg by which it is connected with the post for supporting the wires, and so arranged,...that rain or the moisture of condensation shall not settle around the base of the insulator...

A dry ring is preserved around the base of the insulator, which effectually prevents the excape of electricity.

A is a peg, made of wood or iron, ... for supporting a telegraph-wire, the upper end of which, a, is placed in a vertical position, and fits in the socket of a cap, B, made of glass, flint, or other non-conducting substance, to hold it in place. The insulator B is provided with a groove, b, around the knob at the end, for attaching the wire to it in the ordinary way, as shown in fig. 2. The base or lower part of the insulator B is formed like the hub of a wheel on the peg a, and having a flange or rim, c, projecting from it all around, and curving downward, so as to hang over and enclose an interior cup, d, that surrounds and may form a part of the supporting-peg A, when made of iron, or may be made separately, as a collar, round it, when the peg is made of wood. inner base of the insulator B has a shoulder, e,

around it, which sets low down in the cup d, and has a thin sheet of India rubber or rubber cloth, g, or other flexible, non-conducting material, lapped around it, like a thimble or hood, to be secured thereon by its own contraction, which rubber cover, g, decends nearly to the bottom of the cap d.



This insulator is pictured full size. It is white in color (with black specks showing thru the glaze). The material is a crude gray clay that seems like it would melt in water. The piece has no mold lines and it is not concentric. Possible could have been made on a potters wheel. It has a 3/4" tapered threadless pin hole. 




