

N.I.A. NEWS

Listed are the proposed code of ethics that have been adopted by the National Insulator Association.

NIA members:

- l. shall not engage in the manufacture, sale or exhibition of insulators or related items which can generally be termed frauds and which include, but are not limited to, deceptive reproductions or altered physical characteristics in any matter.
- 2. shall not engage in the manufacture of any reproductions, reprints, replicas, commemoratives or the like without first clearing the design with the NIA to make certain items produced will not be termed "objectional" to the hobby for any reason such as perpetration of fraud by secondary parties.
- 3. shall not engage in the sale, advertisement or exhibition of any insulators or related items deemed by the NIA to be "objectionable" in the best interests of the hobby.
- 4. shall make every effort to comply with standards established by the NIA for the accurate description of the type and condition of insulator specimens.
- 5. shall carry out trade and sale transactions expeditiously and fairly to the satisfaction of all parties involved.
- 6. conduct their collecting activities in a lawful manner and refrain from inferring to the public that the NIA or its members condone any harmful or unlawful practices in the pursuit of the hobby.

- 7. shall not knowingly misrepresent the rarity or value of insulators or related items they offer for sale or trade.
- 8. shall not make public accusations to fellow collectors about possible misconduct of any individual member or affiliated club, and shall refer such matters to the NIA office for arbitration.
- 9. shall not use any NIA emblems, insignia or credentials in any manner detrimental to the interests of the NIA and shall report to the NIA any such use by others.
- 0. shall abide by all rules and policies established by e NIA and not be a disturbing influence at any NIA eetings or insulator shows.





A new find from the McDougald's of North Olmstead, Ohio. This cable top is the crudest one I've ever seen. Made of a reddish pottery, brown glaze, with specks of white and black peppered all over. The piece has some type of pin hole but it is filled in with concrete. From my observations, it appears like this insulator was mounted on a cement wall. This piece was found in the bottom of a pole hole.

This is a full size picture of a regular egg CD 701. Compare this to the "concave egg" opposite page. The unique thing about this egg is it's color. It is clear with some white milk swirls. These are just a few excerpts that we at CROSS ARMS receive. They average about 4 a week. What's happening people? Insulator collecting is the best hobby in existance. Yet I keep hearing-"Antique shops don't carry insulators."--"All we see at the shows are the same old faces."



This insulator (commonly referred to as the twisted pair) was used mainly in fire alarm circuits and usually found in the East. Its application included dead ending, breaking on a series circuit and ordinary side tying.

This shape is listed in a Brookfield catalog and referred to as Style 35.

The & is the only other known embossing and it is not known what it means.

This sheet is made so it is easily removed and placed in a 3 ring binder.

PATENT INFORMATION

W. EDGAR SIMONDS, OF HARTFORD, CONN. Excerpts from Patent No. 92111, June 29, 1869.

Figure 1 is a sectional elevation of an insulator, bearing my improvement, supported upon a standard or peg.

Figure 2 is a sectional elevation of what is commonly known as a "hook" insulator, bearing my improvement.

In Fig. 1- The letter a designates the insulator proper, which is made of glass, hard rubber, flint, or any other proper non-conducting material.

Into the cup is placed, by pouring, while is a state of fusion, or by any other proper process, some non-sonducting or insulating-substance, such as, for instance, and perferably, parafine wax, which should not quite fill the cup (designated in the drawings, both figures, by the letter s.

The letter a designates the insulator proper, made of any proper non-conducting material, and which is fastened into the wooden block, or its equivalent, by any of the well known methods.

The letter c designates the shank, which terminates, at the bottom, in a bifurcated hook, which supports the line-wire b.

The shank c is fastened into the insulator proper, firmly, by any of the well-known methods in common use.


If glass is employed for the material of the insulator proper, this rigid fastening can probably be attained by some modification of the process employed in making the well-known "Leffert's insulator."

WILLIAM W. BALDWIN, OF CLEVELAND, OHIO Excerpts from Patent No. 105,625, July 26, 1870.

Figure 1 is a perspective view. Figure 2 is a vertical section.

This invention consists in the arrangement of two castmetal sections, A & B, and interposing between them a suitable insulating substance, C. The outside section or shell A is intended as a protection to the insulating substance, and to which is to be attached the telegraph-wire, while the inner section B is intended to be placed on a pin on a telegraph-pole, thus making a cheap, durable, and reliable insulator.

In the drawing-- A represents a cast-metal shell or case, which may be in size and form suitable for strength and taste. The inside surface of this shell may have a screw-thread of annular rings cut or cast on it.

B represents a second shell, having a screw-thread or ribs on its outer surface, and is sufficiently smaller than the outer shell A to provide space for the insulating substance C.

The insulator used may be porcelain, gutta-percha, paraffine, wax, or other suitable substance, which will insure a disconnection of the electricity between the two shells.


The lower end or mouth of the shell A is made spherical and hollow, to provide space between it and the mouths of the shell B, which is made flaring or bell-shaped. This is to prevent water or moisture getting in. If water should spatter up inside of the shell it can only moisten the pin, and under side of the shell B.













